Like so many of you, the Music Service team are all greatly missing our regular Music Centre rehearsals and the fabulous music making that has been the hallmark of the work of the Lyceum for generations. With that in mind, we continue to work with the Public Health team to pursue ways in which we might safely resume rehearsals. Comprehensive risk assessments have been conducted around this issue and, whilst capacity of rooms presents a challenge, we hope to be permitted to offer a partial return on some sort of rota basis in the New Year. To that end, we will be sending out questionnaires to members of the various Music Centre groups in January asking them to confirm if they would be interested in taking part in OMC activities on that basis. The response that we get will influence how we structure the rota and how frequently members are able to attend in person. We are also looking at ways in which we can live stream the rehearsals, so that those that cannot be present in person on any particular occasion can take part virtually.

There is no question that this has been a truly terrible year and I know that even if you have been fortunate enough not to be personally affected by this awful pandemic, you will have friends and family members that have not been so lucky. I sincerely hope that you are able to enjoy a peaceful, joyful and healthy Christmas and New Year with your loved ones and that after the holiday we are able, together, to begin the work of restoring so much that we hold dear which has been compromised by the events of 2020.

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Online "Wicked" Music Theatre Workshop

Our choral students have had another brilliant opportunity to work with a Music Theatre professional. The workshop was led by Amy Goodwin (Vice-Principal, YSBD Theatre Academy). Our students were put through their paces learning the dance routine for "Loathing".



At the end of the workshop, we had a Q&A session with Amy who is a former cast member of the UK/Ireland tour of "Wicked". She played the role of Glinda in the production. It was fascinating to hear about the role of the "Swing" in theatre. The Swing has to learn every dance routine and song for <u>all</u> of the roles in the musical. If there are 10 songs, each with 10 different choreography routines, that can be up to 100 different routines to learn!

We are very grateful to the Families and Friends of Oldham Music Service for funding these marvellous opportunities for our students. The online workshops have been instrumental in keeping our young musicians engaged with Music Centre activities and maintaining the sense of belonging and community that is such an important aspect of our work. We had some lovely feedback from our students:

Hannah Penny: Junior RNCM & National Youth Concert Band



Music Centre flautist Hannah Penny has recently taken up a place at the Junior Royal Northern College of Music. JRNCM is a vibrant community of gifted young musicians aged 8 to 18 who come together to develop their talent within the Royal Northern College of Music.

Hannah started playing the flute in Year 3, having lessons with Subject Leader for Woodwind, Kath Thomas (then Dunning) and joining the training wind band. She has worked her way through to both the Youth Wind Band and the Youth Orchestra (where she also plays the piccolo) and has played

at many events including the tour to Lake Garda and the Music for Youth Proms at the Royal Albert Hall.

Her love of music has led her to set her sights on studying at a conservatoire after finishing her A Levels so, Mrs. Thomas suggested that she should audition for JRNCM who meet for a full day every Saturday. After a very strange COVID-safe process of video auditions she was accepted and started in September this year.

She has one-to-one flute and saxophone lessons, is part of a flute quartet and hopefully after the new year will be able to play in a scaled down COVID-secure orchestra, there are also academic lessons such as composition and musicianship.

Hannah's mum said, "JRNCM is definitely a great opportunity but one that would not have been possible without the nurturing from Kath and the Oldham Music Centre family as a whole."

Hannah is currently preparing for her grade 8 flute exam and potential conservatoire auditions which will be held in December of 2021. As the newsletter went to press, Hannah received the exciting news that she has successfully auditioned for the National Youth Concert Band and will attend a week-long residential week in Birmingham over the Easter break.

Abbie Britain: Chetham's School of Music

Abbie Britain, a member of our Training Wind Band and Y7 pupil at North Chadderton, has been offered a wonderful opportunity to attend Chetham's School of Music. Chetham's is the largest specialist Music School in the UK and a thriving creative community involving over 300 students aged 8-18, whose common passion is music. Entry to the school is based solely on musical ability or potential, never on background or ability to pay, thanks to generous bursaries through the Government's "Music and Dance Scheme".

Abbie had small-group flute lessons at Thorp School with Mrs Meaden. In November 2019, Mrs Meaden invited Abbie to attend a flute workshop at Chet's. She was so inspired, she decided she wanted to attend Chet's in the future. In January of this year, Abbie had an "advice lesson" at Chet's. She was told she was good and they could see her potential, but she needed to be around grade 5 standard to gain a place. They advised her to audition 12 months later. Always a determined girl, Abbie set her mind to practising hard and she had 1-1 Zoom lessons with Mrs Meaden. Following this, Abbie submitted a video audition for Chet's in May and was offered a place for September 2021 because the school is currently full. Then, out of the blue, Tom Redmond (Joint Principal at Chet's) rang Abbie to share the exciting news that a place was available from this January.

Abbie is thrilled with the prospect of joining Chetham's School of Music and said, "I wouldn't be the flute player I am without Mrs Meaden's time, effort and encouragement. I can't wait for the next part of my flute journey and I hope I make Mrs Meaden proud."

Making Music at Christmas

Despite the Covid restrictions, children across Oldham have been making music and experiencing the great joy and sense of achievement that this brings.

The Year 3 children at Ss Aidan & Oswald's RC School have worked with Mr Wilson in their Whole Class Instrumental Tuition (WCIT) lessons to perform a virtual Christmas concert for the rest of the school. After only one term of tuition, they are already playing pieces together in an ensemble.





"Reindeer on the Roof" is always a hit with our young musicians and the audience. Some children sang solos in a very moving performance of "Child in a Manger Born".

The performance was filmed and will be shared with families too.





Our EYFS team have been busy bringing Christmas cheer to nursery and reception classes. Our Tune-in to Talking sessions support speech and language development through the use of Music. Have you ever seen such happy snowmen riding on the sledge?!

The children at Oldham Hulme Grammar Nursery & Infants have been working with Mrs Brocklehurst to make their own shakers and drums. They have explored countless ways to play the shakers:

shake, tap, rock (forwards, backwards, up and down) and roll. They also managed to make them into guiros by scraping the lids!





The children have decorated drum cardboard boxes with

pictures and musical instrument stickers. They have played along to *The Grand Old Duke of York*, "Liberty Bell" and, of course, some Christmas songs. The final flourish has been using the instruments in a Christmas song as rustling presents and reindeer hooves.

He has delivered training courses to teachers internationally and across the UK, as well as leading projects in schools and colleges.

This course is for all Upper KS2 & KS3 teachers who are interested in developing techniques to get pupils started in beatboxing. Faz Shah will lead you through an engaging session exploring body percussion & beatboxing and how to layer sections, basic core rhythms and facilitation techniques to nurture creativity from a whole class.



Please note that this session will be divided into three 40-mins sessions with a short break in between.
